## A Proclamation

## CELIAC DISEASE AWARENESS MONTH MAY 2009

WHEREAS, Millions of individuals and their family members are facing the challenges of living with Celiac Disease; and

**WHEREAS,** Celiac Disease is a lifelong autoimmune intestinal disorder, found in individuals who are genetically susceptible. People with the disease cannot tolerate certain proteins (Gluten) found in common cereal grains such as wheat, barley and rye; and

WHEREAS, When a person with Celiac Disease eats foods containing these proteins, their immune system responds by damaging the small intestine, which can lead to malnourishment. If left untreated, this damage can be chronic and life-threatening; and

WHEREAS, Celiac Disease affects 1 in 133 Americans and is the most common autoimmune disease in the United States, according to the Celiac Disease Foundation; and

WHEREAS, Max Renke, a young New Hampshire native, has used his personal experience with Celiac Disease to work tirelessly to raise greater awareness around the disease. He was instrumental in the passage of federal legislation regarding food labeling and continues to work in the political arena to spread his message and ideas. Max is a prime example of how one person can make a difference in the lives of many; and

WHEREAS, It is important that schools offer gluten-free lunches to accommodate the dietary needs of students' with Celiac Disease; and

WHEREAS, Greater knowledge, research and awareness around Celiac Disease is still necessary. According to the Celiac Disease Foundation, for every person that is diagnosed there are at least 89 who go undiagnosed for years; and

WHEREAS, Celiac Disease Awareness Month provides an opportunity to recognize individuals and their families whose lives have been affected by this disease, honor dedicated health professionals and researchers and raise public awareness;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JOHN H. LYNCH, GOVERNOR of the State of New Hampshire, do hereby proclaim MAY 2009 as CELIAC DISEASE AWARENESS MONTH in New Hampshire.
